Jesus invites us to follow him. A Disciple is a follower of Jesus. Being a disciple is a life-long adventure of following Jesus. It begins by surrendering our will to his will. The Kingdom Discipleship Series will help you fall more in love with Jesus, and to join him in his mission to draw the world to the Father through his Spirit. We invite you to embrace your calling to be on mission with God locally and globally.

Kingdom Discipleship covers eight weeks with five lessons per week. Each lesson takes about 15 minutes. Kingdom Discipleship works best one-on-one with a friend. You can also use the material in small groups. Meeting once a week one-on-one or in a small group enables you to discuss and apply Kingdom Discipleship with others. We encourage you to use these two questions when you meet with others one-on-one.

- 1. What did you learn this week?
- 2. What is Your Next Step?

Kingdom Discipleship consists of four sections:

Section One: Being A Disciple

Basic Discipleship

Jesus said to him, "I am the way, and the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me." John 14:6 ESV

Basic Discipleship uses 1 John 2:12-14 as a template for spiritual growth and development. This passage outlines the process of moving from being a child in the faith, to growing as a spiritual youth, to maturity as a parent to others in their journey with Jesus.

Walking in Freedom

"So, if the Son sets you free, you will be free indeed." John 8:36 ESV

Walking in Freedom continues to unpack 1 John 2:12-14 by looking at what it means to overcome the evil one and to be strong in moral character. Walking in Freedom deals with our hurts, habits, and hang-ups. Untangling ourselves from hinderances empowers us to fulfill our life calling.

Section 2 - Making Disciples

The Roman Road

"Go Make Disciples of all nations." Matthew 28:19 ESV

The Roman Road examines the book of Romans as a practical guide of moving from Being a Disciple to Making Disciples. The first half of Romans outlines the life of Being a Disciple and the second half focuses on Making Disciples. Those whom God rescues become rescuers of others.

Section 3 - Multiplying Disciples

Acts of Love

"You will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the end of the earth" Acts 1:8 (ESV)

God desires for you to be fruitful and multiply! The book of Acts provides a model for moving beyond Being a Disciple and Making Disciples to Multiplying Disciples, Leaders, Churches, and Movements. The book of Acts tells how mobile apostolic training teams push the kingdom from local impact to global impact. Understanding our gifting and the importance of teams, empowers us to live the book of Acts once again.

The Kingdom Discipleship process moves one from being a disciple, to making disciples, to multiplying disciples, leaders, churches and movements. At times, growth seems slow. It is important to remember, "Progress in the process equals success." Discipleship is a life-long journey of following Jesus. Take Your Next Step.

Benefits of Kingdom Discipleship include learning

- How to be a disciple
- How to share your faith with others
- How to study and apply the Bible individually and in community
- How to engage meaningfully in prayer
- How to discern God's will

- How to overcome hurts, habits and hang-ups
- How to make disciples
- How to multiply disciples, leaders, churches, and movements

Week 1 - Day 1 Introduction



If you have an apple, place it in front of you, if not - imagine an apple in front of you.

"What do you see?" Write it down?

What else do you see? Write down more details.

Look again. What is the apple's potential? Write down what comes to mind.

Some may say, "An apple." Others might add, "A red apple or a green apple." Someone might say, "A tree;" another might add, "An orchard."

An orchard, hmm, or "orchards." An apple is a package of seeds with the potential to reproduce orchards. Kingdom Discipleship is a package of seeds. Our desire is for you to plant these seeds and reproduce trees, and orchards until Jesus comes back. God's desire is to multiply disciples, leaders, churches and movements until Jesus Christ returns in the fulness of his Kingdom.

The goal of this material is to help you join Gob by taking Your Next Step in Multiplying Disciples, Multiplying Leaders, Multiplying Churches, and Multiplying Movements over a lifetime.

The Key Word is MULTIPLY.

We want to join God in multiplying disciples, leaders, churches, and movements both locally and globally. Both/And thinking rather than Either/Or thinking is needed to move beyond localism.

Remember, Discipleship is a life-long Journey...

When we become followers of Jesus, he accepts us where we are, but he does not leave us where he found us. He places his Spirit within us to help us grow and mature. He desires to move us from being disciples to making disciples. The goal of this is to join God by "Turning Disciples into Disciple Makers."

Kingdom Discipleship is uniquely designed to serve three purposes. It is a:

- 1. Relational Model of Discipleship able to reach entire families and friend groups
- 2. Sticky Model easily memorized using symbols, illustrations, and stories
- 3. Local and Global Model, Both (Local)/And (Global) not Either (Local)/Or (Global).

Relational

Jesus' training of the 12 Disciples in the New Testament was relational training. He called Peter and Andrew; they were related as brothers. He called James and John; they also were brothers. Nathaniel was from same hometown as Peter, Andrew, James, and John. Jesus referred to his closest followers as his friends.

Jesus' relational approach is our example. We too desire to follow a relational approach as we journey together as friends. This is why it is important to connect with someone one-on-one, a friend, as you go through this material together. This material is not designed to be done alone.

<u>Sticky</u>

The following content uses illustrations to help you learn. The apple was our first example. This study will use colors, symbols, and diagrams as "learning hooks" to help you grasp the main points of Kingdom Discipleship. Our team's goal is for you to be able to reproduce these lessons on a napkin at Starbucks. Once you have learned the key illustrations, you could literally reproduce each lesson on a napkin at a coffee shop.

Local and Global

Jesus' desire is for the world to know him. This includes your family, friends, neighbors, and the whole earth. God promises global impact in the following two verses.

"For the earth will be filled with the knowledge of the glory of the LORD, as the waters cover the sea." Habakkuk 2:14 NASB

"But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you shall be My witnesses **both** in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, **and** even to the remotest part of the earth." Acts 1:8 NASB

The original audience for the second verse was Jews in Jerusalem. Notice the progression of Acts 1:8. The verse begins where the disciples were but moved out from there to include the ends of the earth. The movement was from local to global.

Today, we introduced the overall vision of Kingdom Discipleship. Tomorrow, we will examine four key sections of Scripture where Jesus defines for us what is required to be his follower, his disciple. Ask God to give you a heart to learn and obey him.

Week 1 - Day 2

A Disciple Is...

Matthew 4:19 (ESV) "And he said to them, "Follow me, and I will make you fishers of men."

Matthew 28:18-20 (ESV)

18 And Jesus came up and spoke to them, saying, "All authority has been given to Me in heaven and on earth. 19 Go therefore and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit, 20 teaching them to observe all that I commanded you; and Io, I am with you always, even to the end of the age."

Jesus' final command to his disciples was to "*make disciples*". The process is to include going, baptizing, and teaching. But what is a disciple? How does Jesus define discipleship?

According to Jesus, a disciple is a lover, learner, loser, and leader.

A Disciple is:

1. <u>A Lover:</u> Has a desire to love others

"By this all people will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another." John 13:35 ESV

Draw a picture of what it means to love others.

2. <u>A Learner</u>: Has a hunger for the Word of God

"So Jesus said to the Jews who had believed him, 'If you abide in my word, you are truly my disciples, and you will know the truth, and the truth will set you free.'" John 8:31-32 ESV

Draw a picture of what it means to abide in God's word.

3. <u>A Loser:</u> Has a willingness to leave lesser things

"If anyone comes to me and does not hate his own father and mother and wife and children and brothers and sisters, yes, and even his own life, he cannot be my disciple." Luke 14:26 ESV

"So therefore, any one of you who does not renounce all that he has cannot be my disciple." Luke 14:33 ESV $\,$

Draw a picture of what it means to let go of lesser things.

4. A Leader: Has a heart to lead others to Jesus

"By this my Father is glorified, that you bear much fruit and so prove to be my disciples." John 15:8 ESV

Draw a picture representing bearing much fruit.

Of the four (Lover, Learner, Loser, Leader), which causes you the most trouble? Take a few moments and pray through each of the Scriptures listed under each of the headings. Talk with Father about your relationship with him. Be honest about where you are struggling.

For someone to become a follower of Jesus, a disciple, the Holy Spirit must draw them to the Father through the Son – Jesus Christ. As disciples, we are to tell others. God uses the process of telling others as his primary way of bringing people into the kingdom. This process is known as evangelism.

Bring them in

Bring to the Father (Bring people into the kingdom)

Yellow Sun



This symbol and color represent bringing others into the light.

"For the Son of Man came to seek and to save the lost." Luke 19:10 (ESV) Jesus said to him, "I am the way, and the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me. John 14:6 (ESV) Take your colored pencils, highlight the two verses above in yellow. Then draw the symbol of the sun under each verse.

We are to bring people into the light of God's love. The Bible uses the metaphor of "walking with God" through the pages of Scripture. We are called by God to help others walk in the light.

Build them up

Build in the Son (Build them up, or grow them up in the Kingdom)

Green Tree



For we are God's fellow workers. You are God's field, God's building. 1 Corinthians 3:9 (ESV)

I live in a city and we think of building; however, my father was a farmer. Paul uses both ideas of growing and building. Therefore, I use build and grow interchangeably. The desire is to spread out, to build, to grow, to multiply.

And what you have heard from me in the presence of many witnesses entrust to faithful men who will be able to teach others also. 2 Timothy 2:2 (ESV)

Highlight the two verses above in green. Then draw the symbol of the tree under each. Send them out

Send in the power of the Holy Spirit to proclaim the kingdom

Blue Sky with a crown. The crown represents the kingdom. The cloud signifies we are to go outside into the world to declare the kingdom.



And I heard the voice of the Lord saying, "Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?" Then I said, "Here I am! Send me." Isaiah 6:8 (ESV)

And Jesus came and said to them, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you. And behold, I am with you always, to the end of the age." Matthew 28:18-20 (ESV)

God gifted each of us to accomplish His mission in and through us. He sends us out as gifted people to serve Him and others. As we go out, may He give us blue skies. In America, we use a phrase, "The sky is the limit," meaning we are to reach out as far as possible. We are to reach out beyond our people group to multiply disciples, leaders and churches around the world.

Red Shepherd's Staff



How I did not shrink from declaring to you anything that was profitable and teaching you in public and from house to house. Acts 20:20 (ESV)

I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep. John 10:11 (ESV)

In 2008 I traveled to India for the first time. I met a man who quoted a couple of mission statements from large churches in the United States. He asked me my mission statement. I said, "Bring them in, Build them up, Send them out, Publicly and House to House." He said he like it. Then I asked him for his. I was unprepared for his answer. He said, "Greater love has no one than this, Jesus died for me, and I will die for him." In 2017, he and his wife both died. Jesus said a good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep. In honor of my friend who was a good shepherd, I use red as the color for the shepherd's staff.

Leadership is both private and public. The metaphor of shepherd is used throughout Scripture to refer to leaders. A shepherd is willing to lay down his life for the sheep, willing to shed his or her blood to protect the sheep. God is calling you to be leaders who will lay down your dreams, agendas, desires, and very lives if necessary.

House to House

House to House Brown Home



How I did not shrink from declaring to you anything that was profitable and teaching you in public and from house to house. Acts 20:20 (ESV)

Use brown to highlight "house to house." Now draw two houses symbolizing using your home as a center for ministry and a second home indicating multiplication by other homes becoming ministry outposts as well.

Leadership starts at home. The home is where we begin making disciples. I married Joan in 1986. Joan and I began using our home as a base for ministry from the beginning. The home is a place where we cannot hide who we really are.

"And they sang a new song, saying, 'Worthy are you to take the scroll and to open its seals, for you were slain, and by your blood you ransomed people for God from every tribe and language and people and nation, and you have made them a kingdom and priests to our God, and they shall reign on the earth.'" Revelation 5:9-10 (ESV)

The mission is to: Bring them in, Build them up, Send them out Publicly, and House to House. The following chart gives examples of how to highlight your Bible according to these themes.

Week 1 - Day 4 The Key Passage

The Key Passage

12 I am writing to you, little children, because your sins are forgiven for his name's sake. 13 I am writing to you, fathers, because you know him who is from the beginning. I am writing to you, young men, because you have overcome the evil one. I write to you, children, because you know the Father. 14 I write to you, fathers, because you know him who is from the beginning. I write to you, young men, because you are strong, and the word of God abides in you, and you have overcome the evil one. 1 John 2:12-14

The Bring Build Send model is lived out in **public and private contexts**. Another way of viewing this is in **large (Public) and small groups (House to House)**. "Publicly" includes our large group gatherings of the church, but also our life out in the world. "House to House" means **both our family and the importance of using our home as a base for ministry**. Houses rather than buildings were used for the first couple hundred years of the church. The New Testament church met "Publicly and House to House." We are advocating a return to this New testament model of a **two-winged church**: A large group wing and a small group wing. The two-winged church will fly.¹

Children, Youth and Parents live out their faith in two environments -




"For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him shall not perish, but have eternal life.".





Well actually, it is about one God, two people and three trees.


When God created the world, he placed Adam and Eve in the middle of a garden. This story is found in Genesis 1-3. God gave Adam and Eve tremendous freedom. They could eat from any tree in the garden except one - the tree of the knowledge of good and bad, but instead of obeying God, Adam and Eve chose to eat from the tree they were told not to. Their bad decision of disobedience created chaos in the world.



Humanity responded to the ensuing chaos by seeking to establish their own measures of goodness; they created a ladder (tower) trying to reach the heavens based on their own goodness. The details can be found in Genesis 4-11. The remainder of the book of Genesis (and the rest of the Old Testament) shows humanity's various religious attempts (a taller ladder) for trying to establish their own standards of righteousness. All three approaches: Bad, Good (Ladder), and Religious (Ladder) fell short of God's standards. All three approaches are based on self. The bad seek their own way. The good seek their own way. The religious seek their own way by following self-made rules.



In God's mercy, he introduces a second tree. It is a tree that becomes a cross on which God demonstrates his love. S-"I"-N is living life with "I" in the middle. God placed our sin on his Son. "For God so loved..." He sent his Son who took humanity's sin and nailed it to the cross. Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John tell us this story. Jesus died on a cross, three days later he rose from the dead. He ascended to the Father and promises to return. Because God's wrath was placed on his Son on the cross, we can receive his resurrected life; this life is a life of overflow to others, and results in his kingdom reign becoming our present reality.



The bad, the good, and the religious all fail to reach God. However, those who believe in God's provisional righteousness by trusting in the Son can eat of third tree, the tree of life. The tree of life is introduced in the first chapter of the Bible and reintroduced in Revelation 22, the last chapter of the Bible. Those who reject the tree of life face death, separation from God eternally. To receive God's offer of life, here is a simple prayer of response.

God, I give everything I know about me, the good, the bad and the ugly, to everything I know about you.

Week 2 - Day 1

The Listening Room

Turn to 1 John 2:12-14. Notice the three characteristics John uses to identify spiritual youth. Take your green pencil and highlight the three things that characterize youth. One of the qualities John mentions regarding spiritual youth is, "they are strong." Prayer is one of the keys to spiritual strength. Developing a daily prayer pattern is essential for growing in your personal walk with God. Prayer is a two-way street. Prayer is not just you talking to God; it is also you listening to his voice. Here is a template for developing a consistent and meaningful prayer life.

Make an appointment with God

- 1. Set a time to meet daily with God.
- 2. Set a place to meet daily.

3. Spend some time reading through a passage of **Scripture** and ask God to speak

to you.

- 4. Write down in a **journal** impression He places in your heart or mind.
- 5. Pray for the things on your heart and mind.

Jesus said,

Perhaps you have prayed this prayer before. It is often called The Lord's Prayer. You can use The Lord's Prayer as an outline, or model for prayer as well.

1. Worship, praise and thanksgiving

"Our Father who is in heaven,

Hallowed be Your name."

2. Ask for His rule and reign in matters that concern you

"Your kingdom come."

3. Ask for His will in your circumstances

"Your will be done, On earth as it is in heaven."

4. Ask for daily needs to be met

"Give us this day our daily bread."

5. Ask forgiveness for thoughts, words or deeds not honoring to Him

"And forgive us our debts, as we also have forgiven our debtors."

6. Ask for protection from the evil one

"And do not lead us into temptation but deliver us from evil."

7. Close by declaring His kingdom

"For Yours is the kingdom and the power and the glory forever. Amen."

God is looking for a heart of obedience motivated by grace. The religious leaders of Jesus' day sought to gain merit with God by reading their Bibles. Jesus confronts them by saying the Scriptures point to him.

You search the Scriptures because you think that in them you have eternal life; and it is they that bear witness about me, John 5:39 ESV

The goal of biblical instruction is obedience not knowledge.

Jesus came and told his disciples, "I have been given all authority in heaven and on earth. Therefore, go and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit. Teach these new disciples to obey all the commands I have given you. And be sure of this: I am with you always, even to the end of the age." Matthew 28:18-20 NLT

Becoming a believer in Jesus is the beginning of a journey that involves growing in our faith through the reading of God's word, prayer and being discipled in the local church.

26 Start your Bible reading by asking...

What is the intended meaning of the original writers? In what context did they write?

I once heard pastor Charles Simpson quote an old preacher as saying, *"The Bible sheds a lot of light on the commentaries."* His point was the Bible is inspired not what others say about the Bible.

Here are some clues to effectively studying the Bible

1. Text

What does the text say?

Is it descriptive or prescriptive? If it is poetry, approach it as such. If it is history, read it accordingly. If it is describing a phenomenon, read it that way (In Joshua chapter 10 the Bible says the sun stood still. This is how it appeared to the viewer. We use similar language when we say the sun rose and the sun set). The author is describing an event as the phenomenon appeared. This is descriptive. Other passages, like Matthew 28:19-20 tell us to "make disciples." Matthew is prescribing how we are to act, not simply describing an event.

2. Context

What is the context of what is said (By reading 10 verses before and 10 verses after a given section of Scripture, you gain a broader understanding of the context of the passage)?

Rather than pick an isolated chapter here or there or a verse here or there, read the Bible as it was written, in books. For example, read Matthew or Luke or the Psalms systematically, straight through. If you are reading a given verse or verses within a given book, it is important to remember its broader context. What sentences are immediately before it, what follows.

An example of failing to read the context would be claiming there is no God based on Psalm 14:1 which says that "there is no God." Without reading the context, one could claim that the Bible teaches that "there is no God." However, if you look at the context, the verse actually says,

The fool has said in his heart, "There is no God." Psalm 14:1 ESV

Context is important.

3. Supporting Texts

When you come across a topic of interest, look to see if the there are other places in the Bible where the topic is addressed. Then compare the passages for greater clarity. This keeps us from simply proof texting to support a myopic view. For example, you may want to look up what the Bible says about giving or baptism.

When we read verses in isolation without looking at other verses on the same topic, we can end up with partial understanding. One example would be looking at verses on poverty.

A little sleep, a little slumber, a little folding of the hands to rest, and poverty will come upon you like a robber, and want like an armed man. (Proverbs 24:33-34 ESV)

This verse highlights that sometimes poverty can be the result of laziness. But the Bible contains many other verses that discuss the causes of poverty, such as oppression, injustice, violence, greed and the overall broken state of the world.

I like to ask two questions when I read the Bible.

- 1. What: What does the passage say?
- 2. Now What: Now what is God saying I need to do about it?

Prayer



Week 2 - Day 4

The Main Theme - The Kingdom

The Bible has one uniting theme - The Kingdom of God.

The Kingdom refers to the Rule and Reign of God. In Zambia, one of the pastors described the kingdom as "The Village of God." When we proclaim the kingdom, we are declaring the ultimate renewal of all things. "The Kingdom is the good news of renewal."

Our responsibility is to seek the kingdom and to proclaim the kingdom; God's responsibility is to expand the kingdom and establish the kingdom.

The kingdom in the Bible is accompanied by three things.

1. Salvation

Salvation is an event and a process. We are saved. We are being saved. We will

be saved.

2. Healing

When the kingdom is proclaimed in the Bible, signs and wonders follow.

3. Deliverance

When the kingdom is declared, people are set free.

4. "Already" and "Not Yet"

The kingdom is both "already" present and "not yet" complete.

We are to proclaim the message: The King of Kings is present. The manifestation of the kingdom began with Jesus first coming. It will reach its fulfillment when he comes again. When Jesus returns, his kingdom will manifest in all of its fulness. Until then, we ask for his kingdom to come and we expect the future to break into our current reality and experience.

Four characteristics of life in the kingdom include...

1. Life in the Kingdom is Relational - We BRING people to the Father

"Enoch walked with God..." Genesis 5:24 ESV

"No longer do I call you servants, for the servant does not know what his master is doing; but I have called you friends, for all that I have heard from my Father I have made known to you." John 15:15 ESV

2. Life in the Kingdom in Fruitful - We BUILD people in the Son

God designed us to life fruitful lives. The first command he gave was "Be fruitful and multiply..." Genesis 1:28 ESV

Jesus said, By this my Father is glorified, that you bear much fruit and so prove to be my disciples. John 15:8 ESV

3. Life in the Kingdom is Global - We SEND people to the World

"Be fruitful and multiply and fill the earth..." Genesis 1:28

"For the earth will be filled with the knowledge of the glory of the LORD as the waters cover the sea." Habakkuk 2:14

4. Life in the Kingdom is "Already" & "Not Yet" - Publicly & House to House

The Already...God's presence is manifest, and people come to saving faith in Jesus, or people are healed, delivered or touched by God as we live out the kingdom in large (public) and small (house to house) settings.

The Not Yet...We live between the first and second coming of Jesus. Because of this, the full manifestation of God's rule and reign are awaiting His return. The evil one opposes the message of the kingdom. His kingdom ultimately loses. The manifestation of the fullness of God's kingdom is "not yet" but it is coming, because he is coming again. So, we pray... "Your Kingdom come" Matthew 6:10... "And do not bring us into temptation but deliver us from the evil one. For Yours is the kingdom and the power and the glory forever. Amen." Matthew 6:13 HCSB


Spiritual adolescents Overcome the evil one They are strong, *moral character* They know the Word
